NEW PUBLICATIONS

Below we provide details of a number of, mainly, recent publications relating to the archaeology of the county and nearby areas of interest.

Raunds Area Survey: An archaeological study of the landscape of Raunds,

Northamptonshire 1985-94 by Stephen Parry

Raunds Area Project Monograph

The Raunds Area Survey was a major programme of archaeological research into landscape development in Northamptonshire and the wider midland region of England. This volume presents the results of the detailed fieldwalking survey, carried out in the later 1980s, which reveals a dynamic picture of landscape development from the prehistoric through to the creation and early development of villages and open fields (as presented at the 2005 NAS AGM). Raunds Furnells: The Anglo-Saxon church and churchyard by Andy Boddington

English Heritage Archaeological Monograph

This was the first volume relating to the Raunds Area Project, and was published by English Heritage in 1996. It concentrates on the archaeology of the late Saxon church and cemetery established at Furnells manor in the 10th century and in use into the post-Conquest period. This volume is also available from Oxbow Books, currently at its original publication price of £35.00

(The monograph covering other aspects of the archaeology of Furnells manor and other sites in north Raunds will be appearing in 2007, also to be published by Oxbow Books.)

Saxon, Medieval and Post-Medieval Settlement at Sol Central, Marefair, Northampton: Archaeological Excavations 1998-2002 by Pat Miller, Tom Wilson and Chiz Harward

Museum of London Archaeology Service Monograph, 27

Excavation work by Northamptonshire Archaeology and MoLAS of limited parts of the Sol Central development site, formerly occupied by the Barclaycard building, produced a long sequence of occupation. This included a Middle Saxon sunken-floored building, Late Saxon and Norman period settlement, with metalworking and bone working taking place, while a cemetery associated with the chapel of St Martin, was in use between the 10th and 13th centuries. The area continued to develop during the medieval period, with timber and stone buildings and intensifying industrial activity represented by pits, hearths and smithing debris, and by the 14th century the route of Pike Lane was established. The site declined during the 15th and 16th centuries.

Flag Fen: Life and Death of a Prehistoric Landscape by Francis Pryor

Tempus Books

Francis Pryor has been working at the late Bronze Age site of Flag Fen, near Peterborough, for over thirty years, and it has emerged as one of the most important and most understood prehistoric landscapes in Britain. This book comprises a complete reworking of *Flag Fen: Prehistoric Fenland Centre* (1991), reflecting the mass of new material that has been uncovered and gathered during the last fifteen years. Throughout, Pryor reflects on his years at the site, the challenges and triumphs, and his efforts to open the site to the public and make more people aware of this hugely important site and archaeology as a whole (following very much the pattern of his 2004 address to the NAS AGM).

Members might also be interested to know that further archaeological work at Grendon quarry was reported in last years *Proceedings of the Prehistoric Society:*- Last, J, 2005 Life by the River: a **Prehistoric Landscape at Grendon, NorthamptonshIre**, *PPS*, 71, 333-360. This adds to previous investigations reported in volumes 20 and 26 of *Northamptonshire Archaeology*, with a short report on yet more work in the area to appear in the next journal, volume 33.

SOME NOT SO NEW PUBLICATIONS, NUMBER 1

The intention is that recent issues will be available by subscription, so as not to undermine the value of your membership subscriptions, but older issues will be free to all.

As this could be seen to constitute in effect a new publication, as they will be appearing in a different media, there could be an issue of copyright. We would like to think that all who have submitted material to the NAS journal in the past would be only too pleased to see their work made more broadly available, in line with the principles of the society, but if anyone does object to having their reports online please contact either of the co-editors (Andy Chapman & Martin Tingle) and we would have to arrange to have those articles omitted from the online journal.

The detailed report on a large-scale excavation tracing development within the urban nucleus from the Middle Saxon through to the end of the Middle Ages. Includes the Saxon mortar mixers related to the St Peter's church complex.

Bamford, H, 1985 *Briar Hill, Excavation 1974-1978*, Northampton Development Corporation, Archaeological Monograph, 3

Detailed report on the extensive excavation and finds from a Neolithic Causewayed Enclosure and Iron Age and Saxon settlement on the outskirts of Northampton.

Hasting, S, Woods, P, edited and revised by Brown, K, 1984 Rushden: The Early Fine Wares

This report concentrates on the early Roman pottery manufacturing at a multi-period settlement excavated in 1970.
